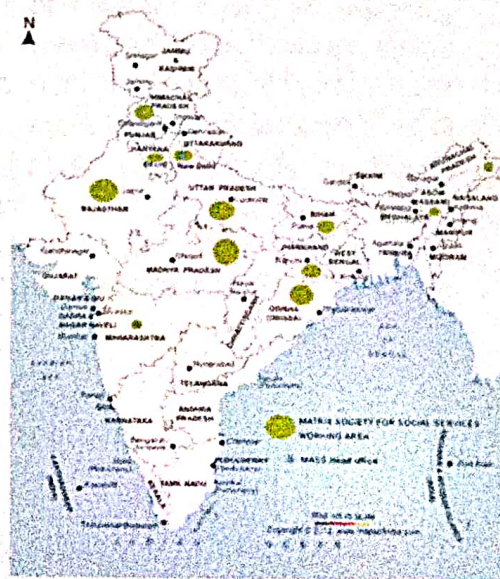

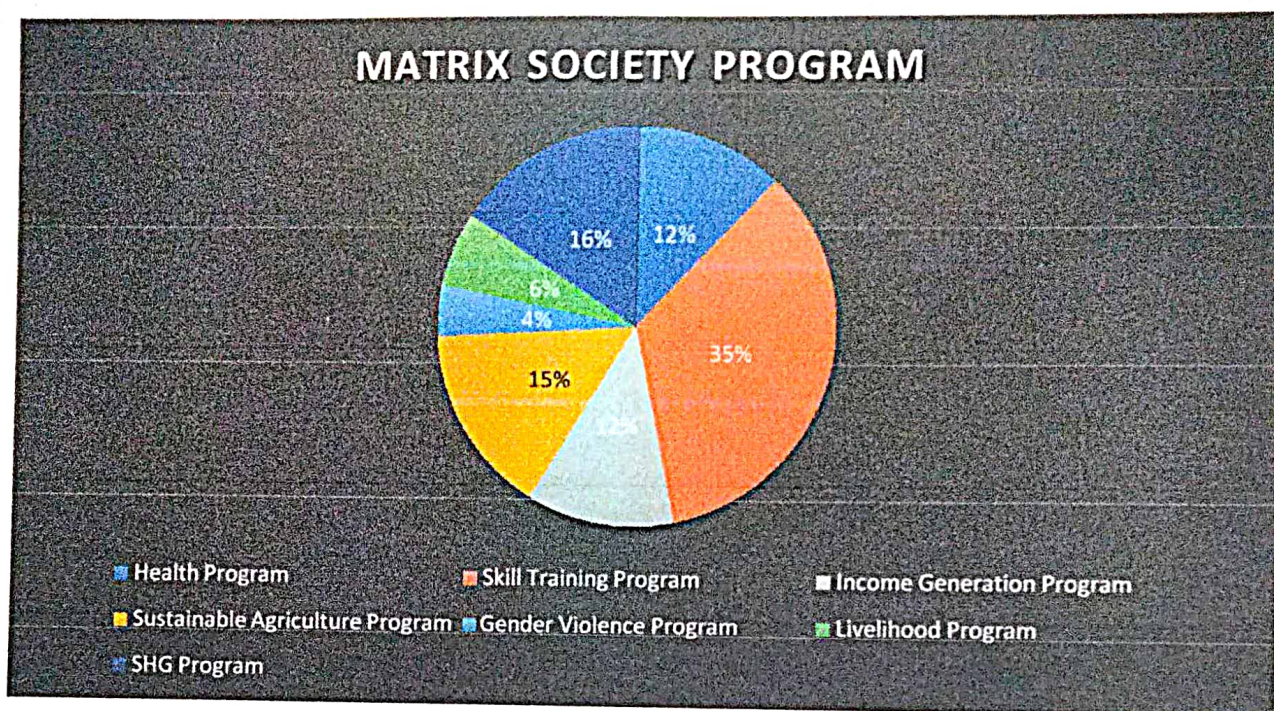
Matrix Society has spread over its presence in eastern part of India, and state capital Delhi and other adjoining NCR zone.

Targeted Intervention among Injecting Drug Users:

Matrix Society has been working in the urban slums of North West Delhi. Its main focus has been on health & education. Therefore HIV/AIDS has been its main concern now a day is an alarming issue. In India the major source of transmission is through sexual intercourse but being a metropolitans city Delhi has high rate of migration & mobility. HIV/AIDS is one of India's complex epidemic and a challenge that is going beyond public health, rising fundamental issues of human rights and threatening development achievement in many areas. It is not a single epidemic but made up of a number distinct epidemic, Beside CSM and MSM, there is another category of IDU's & the shadow IDU'S.

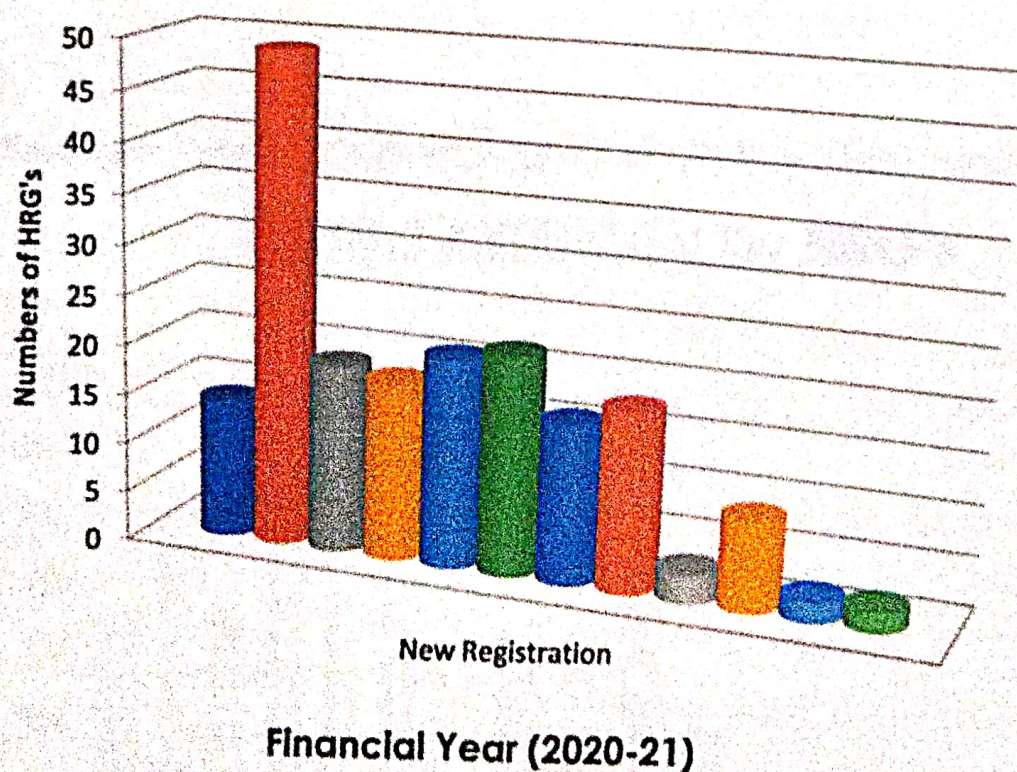
Millions of people worldwide are injection drug user, and blood transfer through the sharing of drug taking equipment, particularly infected needles, is an extremely effective way transmitting HIV. The illegal nature of injection drug use can also create barriers to accessing adequate treatment and prevention services making IDU's more vulnerable to HIV and its effects. The crossover with prostitution further means they are in position to transmit virus between the at-risk BRIDGE POPULATION.

People take drug, both legal and illegal, for a variety of reason that will differ from person to person and from drug to drug. Individual may enjoy the sense of detachment or euphoria that drug creates their realizing or energy-inducing properties, the heightened alertness or sensitivity they produce, and their medicinal qualities. Peer pressure or habit may be the other reason, and if they are chemically dependent, addicts upon an individual's own background and socio-economic circumstances. Heroin is the most common injecting drug in most of the countries and considered as a cheaper and more rapidly acting substance. Most of the IDUs shift from smoking of opium to the injecting of heroin and other drugs. Region wise there could be an individual's involvement in crime, family breakdown, social upheaval, poor health, low income, homelessness, and uses of other drugs, separation from spouse, depression, alienation or other personality traits.

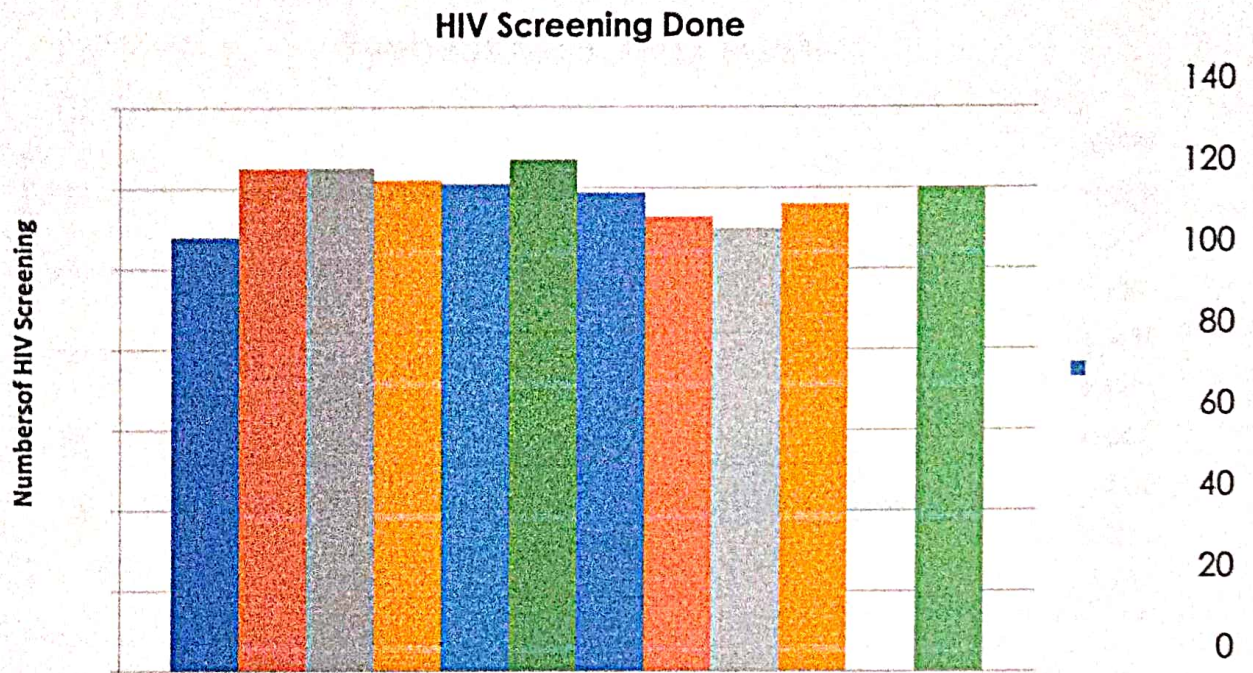
Many factors specific to individual IDUs and countries influence causes needle sharing. For many users sterile syringes are not readily available and it is an offence to distribute or possess syringes for medical purposes. So fear of law is another a major factor in needle sharing. One tenth of HIV infections result from needle sharing. People who inject drugs are perhaps the most marginalized at-risk and vulnerable groups of HIV. IDU's who find themselves on the wrong side of the law and in confrontation with the police may be mistrustful of the authorities in general and hesitate to seek treatment or take advantage of prevention initiative in the first place. Individual who are IDU's and frequently involves in sex work become more vulnerable to HIV and are perhaps doubly stigmatized. The link between substance abuse and sex work is hard to pinpoint through there are a variety of factors of that are common to both including homelessness, unstable family lives, social-economic deprivation, disrupted schooling, local authority care and confidence and esteem issues.

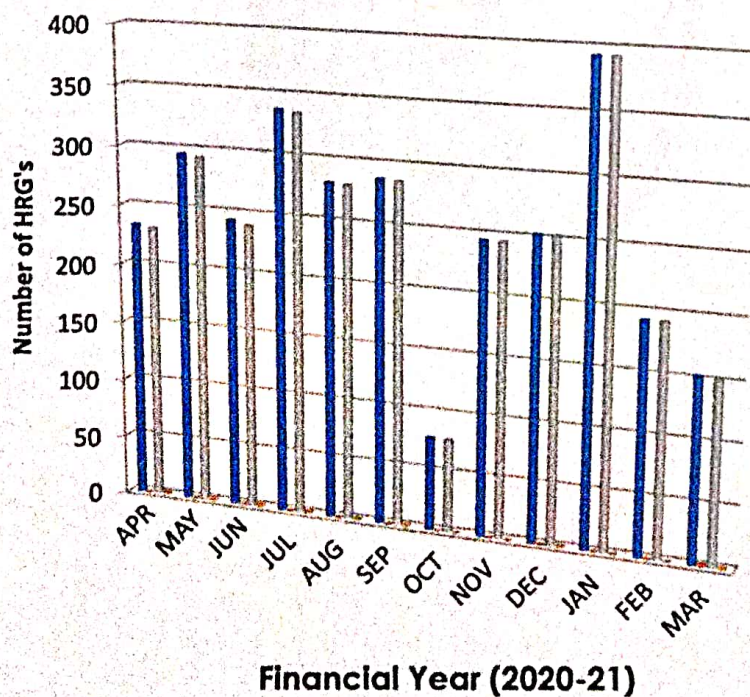

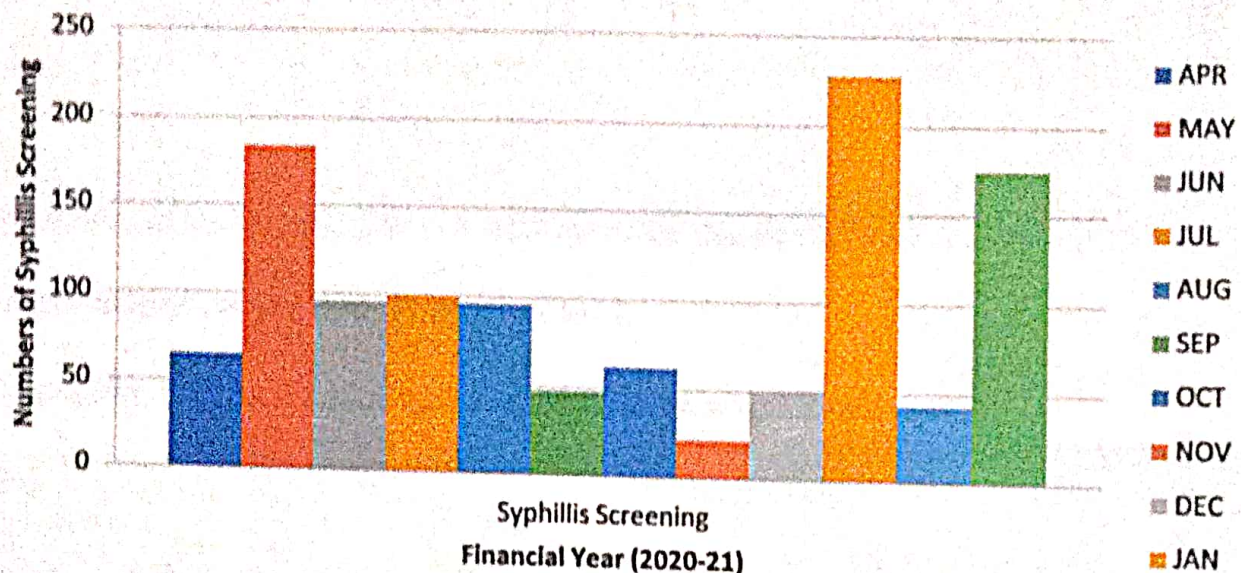

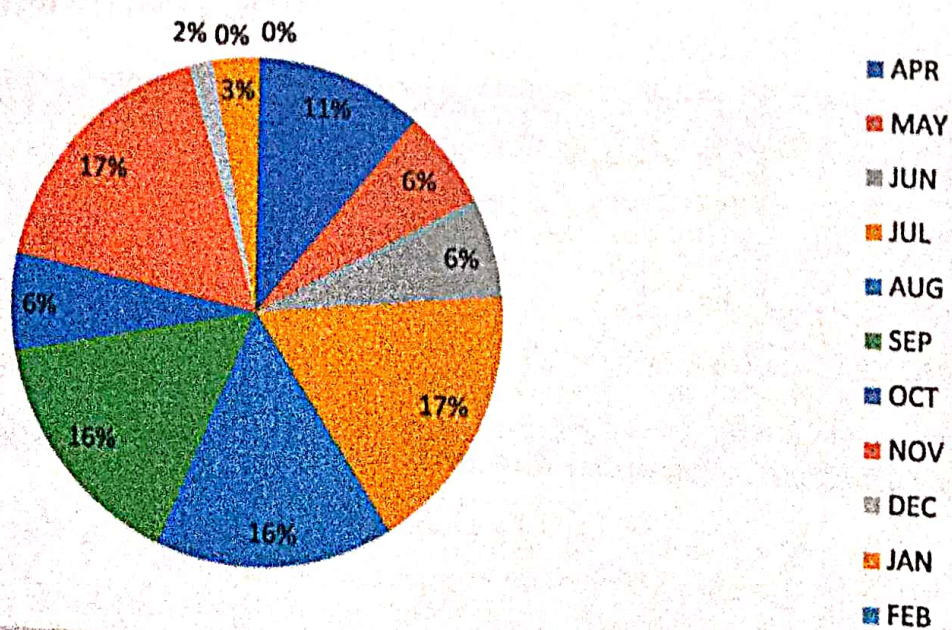

Mahila Panchayat:

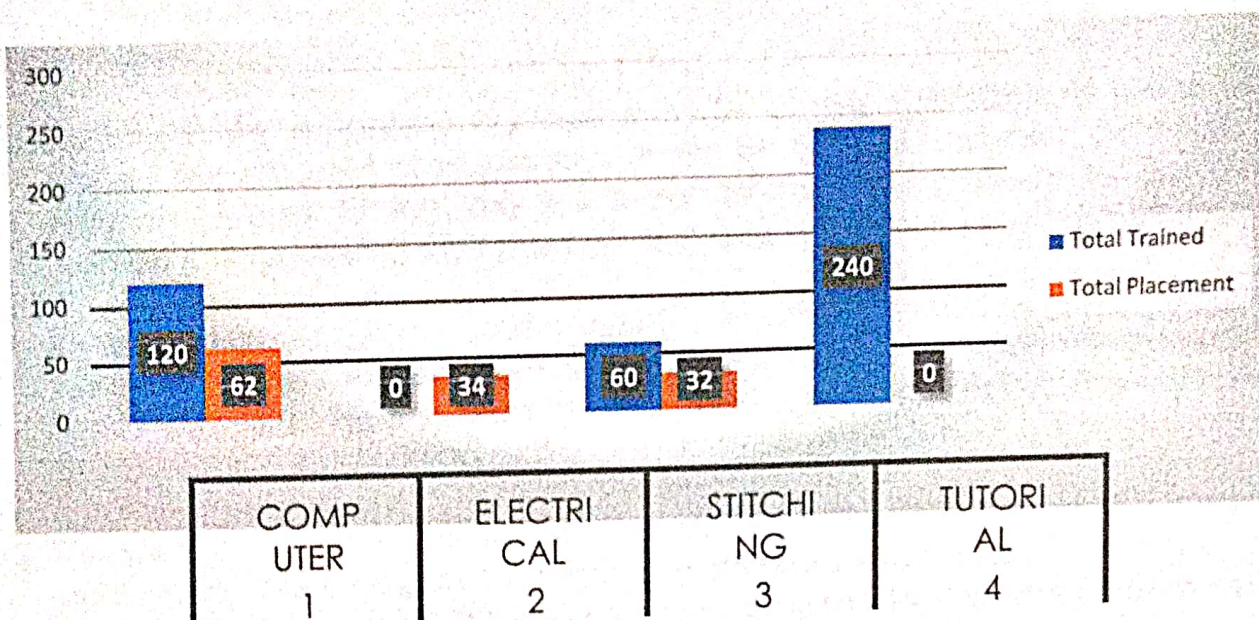
Mahila Panchayat is the initiative for providing legal awareness for empowerment of women. Mahila Panchayat offer crisis intervention and legal aid at community level and help tackle local level legal disputes and assist in reduction and reconciliation of violence against women. Delhi Commission for Women has initiated the program Mahila Panchayat as an innovative collective approach for community participation in dispute redressal. After need assessment and motivation, community leaders are identified and these women are then motivated to volunteer as Mahila Panchayat Members. The MP members are trained in legal issues, dispute redressal mechanism, trained in the laws relevant to crimes against women, given exposure about the existing legal position regarding property, maintenance, marriage, custody, etc. They are also given training in counselling, FIR writing, pursuing with police station, how to proceed for legal recourse. The Mahila Panchayats itself acts as a "Watch Dog" and its members, after orientation, and training, can handle delicate and family disputes. They find solutions at the local level through the workers in the field itself. They link up with lawyers and issues which cannot be resolved at the Mahila Panchayat level are either resolved by the lawyers or alternative course of action is determined in consultation with NGO, lawyer and Delhi Commission for Women.

Matrix society is covering Jahangirpuri-Delhi as project area for Mahila Panchayat and taking cases and resolving them at the community level. These cases pertain to bigamy, maintenance, domestic violence, alcoholism and other issues. In most cases our team members able to resolve the cases at their own level. In some cases, they had to take joint action to bring pressure on the men concerned so as to obtain redressal for the women complainants.

Tata Power Project:

Matrix Society with the support of TPDDL fictionalizing VT center at Rohini Sector 3. The center is well equipped multi story building with AC rooms and with proper well ventilated various class rooms along with waiting hall and center manager room, RO drinking water facility and free electricity.

All training rooms are equipped with the tools and accessories required for teaching students. Since 1st April 2021 Matrix Society is engaged with students in several trades. The VT center covers two courses (Cutting and tailoring and Computer) and 2 tuition classes for children of JJ cluster near to the center.



Teaching Methodology: Matrix Society developed course curriculum cum training module for all three trades i.e. Computer, Cutting and tailoring and Tutorial Classes. The developed module is in pictorial mode and layman language so that it is understood to all. Each staff member has received TOT from consultants of Matrix Society to help them enhance their skill and knowledge in the subject.

Trainers are being imparting day-to-day sessions by using following methodology:

- Theoretical session
- Presentation
- Group Discussion
- Classroom Assignments
- Assessment by government agencies
- Placement of trainees in various companies

Other Activities:

1. Exhibition: we organized our stall in TATA center exhibition in which we display the different craft product make by our SHG women. Exhibition is held on 19 and 20 Jan. This is the one of the best platform for our SHG women to showcasing their product and gets a one of best market platform.
2. Teachers Training: Matrix Society with the support of TATA provide training to our trainers and teachers to deliver best and attractive classes to student in which they learn how to manage the classes, how to observe the behavior of the student, and how to make classes more attractive.
3. Production: we plan a new business model for the SHG women i.e., paper glass production, bag production and different craft material making. All these activities done by the SHG women with a motto to provide sustainable for slum women.
4. Sports activity: We also organised a sports day for the student to cheer up them and change their mind in which different sport competition organized and at the end of the event winners announced and provided with a gift.
5. Paper Glass Project: This Project component aim to support the Mission of 'Say to No Plastic' Tata Power DDL has installed water dispensary machine at Metro stations for safe drinking water purpose. Matrix association with Tata Power DDL installed a Paper Glass making unit at Setor 3 Rohini. The investment of Rs. 7.50 thousand made by Matrix Society for Installation of the machine. Rs. 1.5 Lac has been expensed for procurement of raw material and other Pertaining to the Production. We have formed a Group of poor women from nearby slum. Matrix has provided training for the machine operation and packaging. At present 13 Women from Laxmi SHG are involved in Paper glass production.

Matrix Society with the support of BSES Rajdhani Power Ltd. established Umid Skill Development Centre at Dhansa Village, The centre is well-equipped with proper well ventilated three class rooms along with waiting hall and centre manager room, Matrix also has provided all training equipment's for the better teaching procedure. The centre is covering total 150 candidates (both male and female)

Student Mobilization: During this COVID-19 period Matrix Society team members engaged in community meetings, attended colleges and distributed pamphlets for student mobilization and registered 108 candidates in different trades and also within a week period team members will ensure registration of rest 42 candidates for the current running batch. These trainees will be trained over a period of 6 months. We have done sitting arrangements keeping COVID-19 in mind.

Ongoing Status of Skill Centre: As per the plan our team members are functionalising centre in professional manner keeping social distancing in mind. Every day centre opens with welcome greetings by staffs along with

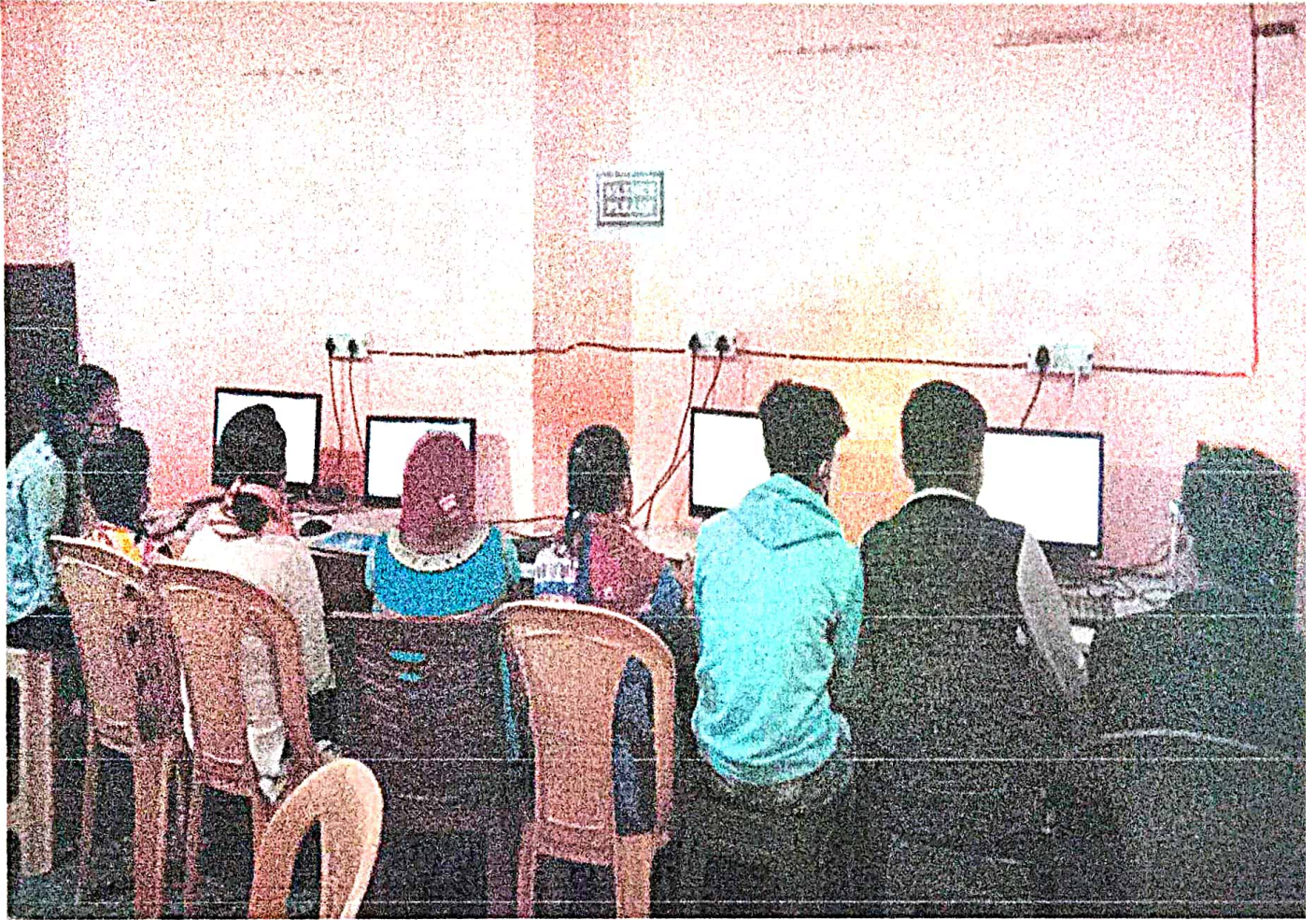


daily attendance. Then after trainers engage student in various theoretical and practical assignments.

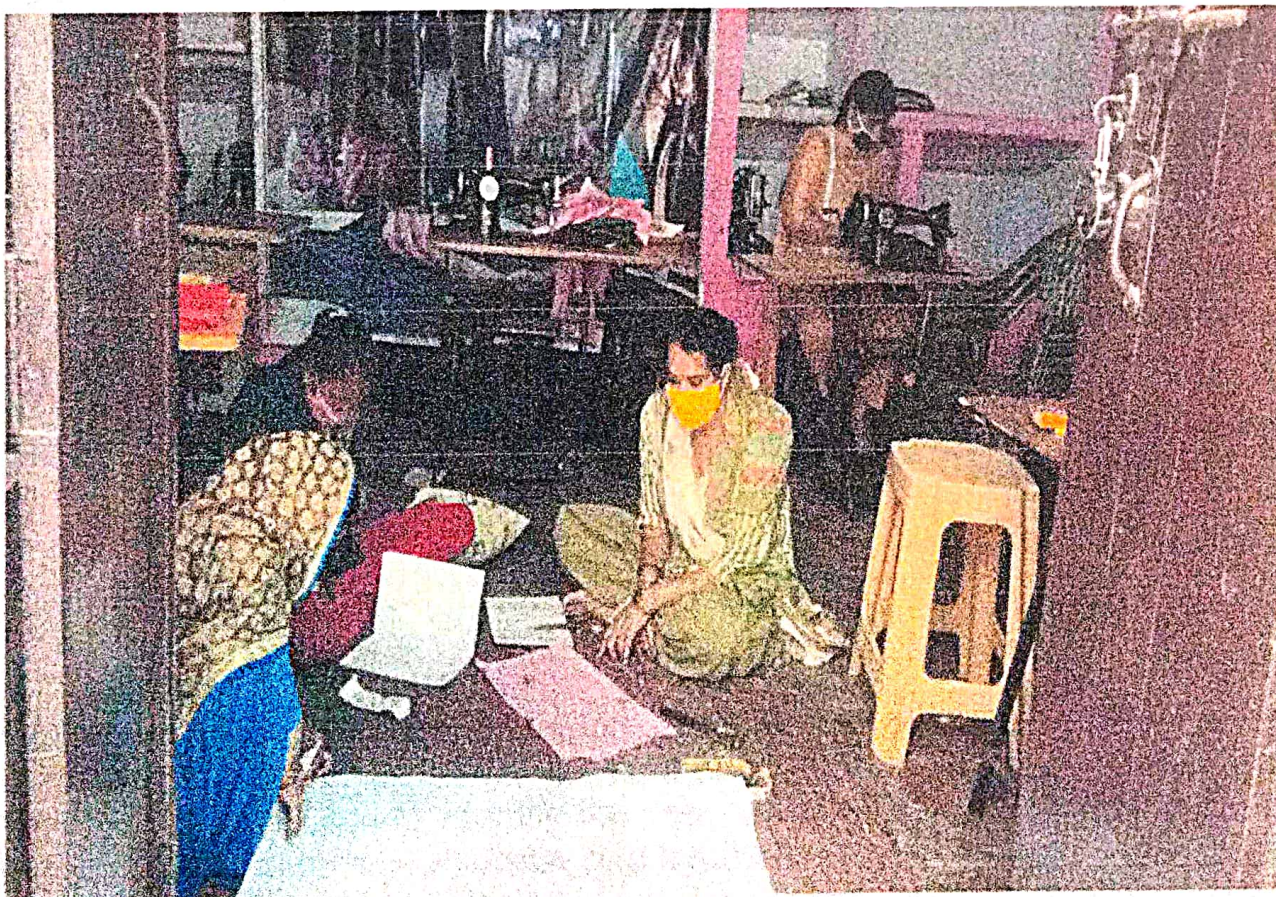

Digital Literacy Centre – RailTel:



Digital literacy is the ability, skills and behavior used to operate digital devices such as smart phones, tablets, laptops and desktop PCs etc. Digital literacy is often confused with the term 'computer literacy' which is often delineated and poorly defined (Goodson & Mangan, 1996). In contemporary context, digital literacy includes basic skills required by the user to operate effectively the software tools or to retrieve basic information from the internet (Buckingham, 2006). Williams et al., (2003) define digital literacy skills at two levels: Level 1 is related to the understanding of common ICT terminology and use of basic software tools (such as word processor and spreadsheet) while Level 2 includes the use of search engines and databases and the ability to have advanced knowledge of software tools. In Indian context, National Digital Literacy Mission (NDLM), quotes digital literacy as 'Digital literacy is the ability of individuals and communities to understand and use digital technologies for meaningful actions within life situations.'

More than half of the Indian population live in 6, 50,000 villages those are still isolated from the benefits of country's impressive economic progress. Despite of the country being the second fastest growing mobile market, it is still lagging in internet connectivity which is considered vital for the social progress and development in the recent years. To overcome this problem, the Government of India has launched the initiative of 'Digital India' with a vision to provide high-speed internet network in rural areas. Digital India initiative slated



for completion by 2019 is also the dream project of our PM, Shri Narendra Modi. To support this initiative Matrix Society has come forward to promote digital literacy among poor community of Nuh District of Mewat, Haryana by establishing Digital Learning Centre at SSH- Ghasera – Nuh with the support of RailTel.

Digital literacy is transforming the lives of our beneficiaries in a significant way. It is the third part of our trio of educational interventions for underprivileged communities - Holistic Education, Skill Development for poor community members and Digital Literacy for all. Our Digital Literacy classes are benefitting hundreds of beneficiaries. It is opening opportunities like never before and giving them a level playing field.

At MATRIX's Digital Literacy classes, participants are taught basics of computers and the internet. They are given personal attention by the instructor and ample time to practice on computers. The participants learn



the basic workings of computers, MS Word, Excel, Paint. They learn to surf the internet, e-mail, online banking and ticket bookings.

We felt that our Digital Literacy class has been doing very well lately and thought that we should arrange some sessions, where they can interact and learn from IT experts. The experts began by asking some basic questions to our Digital Literacy class, to gauge their knowledge and were very impressed. They were delighted to know that those who had never touched a computer before are now paying their electricity bills online!

Breach of Data Privacy is one of the biggest threats in the digital world. The IT experts explained the importance of securing one's identity and data in the virtual world. They explained the importance of Anti-virus in protecting the computers from virtual attacks. They helped them to create secure passwords for their e-mail and banking accounts and showed them how they can detect secured and not-secured websites.

Under this program Matrix Society delivering program in two levels:

Learning Centre at a Glance:



Skill Centre – Mewat

With the support of REC Foundation Matrix society established Ummid skill training centre at Neh, Mewat Haryana. During this year our team members undertook following activities:

Baseline Study: Before starting the programme Matrix Society conducted baseline study in the projected areas. The Matrix Society for Social Services is a non-profit organization working towards the empowerment of the marginalised and excluded sections of the population. Its focus is on women in particular. Matrix Society believes that in order to effectively bring in women's voices in decision making and realize their citizenship rights, it is

critical to address the key impediments to women's public participation, that is, the surge of violence. They have been spearheading the movement for a violence free, gender friendly public environment to promote access and mobility of women. After the successful implementation of WSHG project, Matrix Society has launched its new project 'Empowerment of Women and Girls in Mewat through skill trainings' in Mewat district, Haryana. Matrix Society will be working in close partnership with the Haryana State Government, National Mission for the Empowerment of Women (NMEW), Government of India and GMR group for the empowerment of women and girls in the Mewat region. Mewat is the most backward district of Haryana. Reproductive health, education and livelihoods are critical issues for women in this area.

The objective is to work with women and girls from marginalized sections, to make them agents of development and progress within their communities. The intervention will be in the process of forming women collectives, training them to do gender audits of their own area, sharing the information collected with local stakeholders and state, forming local youth groups, organizing leadership workshops for girls and boys, and introducing sports as a part of physical development. Initiatives related to reproductive health, education and livelihood would be added as layers to this mission as the work progresses in Mewat.

Human Resource: As per the Project guideline, we have recruited following staffs along with Trainers for the project.

Selection process: For the staff selection we followed Matrix Society recruitment policy, all the recruited staffs are well experienced and certified. During initial phase we had conducted in house orientation programme for the staffs.

Skill Centre: Matrix Society team members finalised two places for the skill centre. One is at Hidayat Colony, Delhi Alwar Road, Nuh and another one is at Firojpur Jhirka, Nuh, Haryana. Rent Agreement has already been signed with landlords. Now our team members are engaged in interior design and wall painting, poster and banner fixing for the branding and visibility, though Matrix focus on quality of service delivery. These two centers are well ventilated specius 5 classrooms, one manager room, one staff room, two washroom for participants, waiting space along with reception. The main purpose behind all these arrangement is to make participants feel that they are attending some professional course which will boost their will power. Matrix Named Skill Center as "Ummid Skill Centre".

Enrolment of Candidates for the Centre: During this year we registered 750 candidates for our "Ummid Skill Center – Nuh" and 120 candidates for our "Ummid Skill Center – F.P Jhirka". Team members are engaged in the process of beneficiary registration.

Training Modules: Matrix master Trainers have developed training modules on following trades:

- ⑤ Beauty & Wellness
- ⑤ Food Processing
- ⑤ Hand Embroidery
- ⑤ Cutting & Tailoring
- ⑤ Stationer & Jute Bags

All training modules are developed in simple language along with pictures, games and various exercises. All trainers have received TOT.

SHG Management:

Community Meetings for SHG Formation: The goal of this program is to promote savings- and credit activities, and to promote micro-enterprise development. In order to achieve the project goal we organised various village entry project and meetings on following aspects; which would lead to a strong and permanent improvement of their socio-economic conditions in a number of ways:

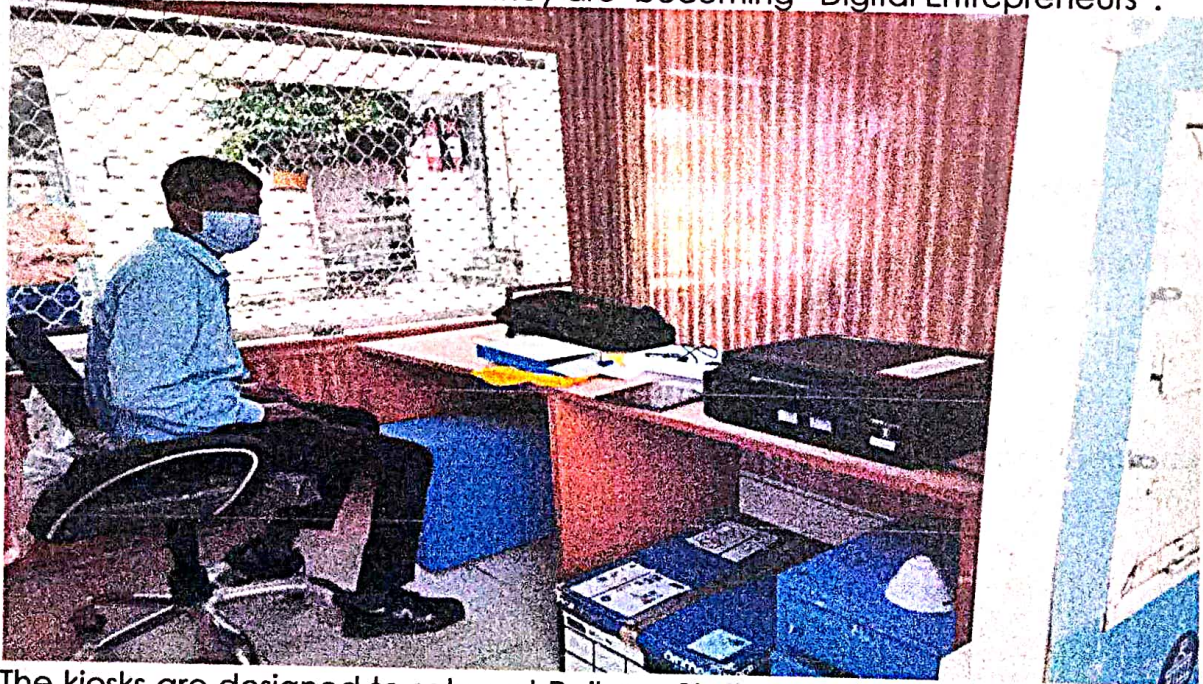
- Initiation of savings and credit activities, and promotion of income generating programs in these self-help groups will bring more economic development and independence to these women and their families. Because of the better welfare of these families, more children will be able to attend school instead of being forced into agricultural child labor.
- For the first time in their life, these disadvantaged rural women and men become organized into groups. The formation of these self-help groups will facilitate discussion of many issues pertaining to their socio-economic, educational and health status. Thus, the formation of this group provides a forum to initiate many participatory activities (including training and awareness camps).
- This process will also lead to increased confidence and social status, especially for women, in their communities. This will encourage these women to participate and contribute in general social and political matters in their respective villages, including women's rights.

Rail Wire Saathi – RailTel: Matrix Society with the support of RailTel



Corporation of India Ltd (RailTel) an ICT arm of Indian Railways has initiated in creating a Digital Entrepreneurship program known as "RailWire Saathi" aiming to build a sustainable way to create Wi-Fi hotspots at Railway Stations across India. Through the RailWire Saathi model unemployed youth can be trained and supported to set up a kiosk with high speed internet connectivity, Wi-Fi hotspot and provide a platform to provide an array of Digital services which will make the business sustainable and provide access to the community.

Access to e-Governance, credit facilities, identity services, tickets etc. are all available online and yet the population which actually transact online is very less specially in Rural areas. In India 390 Mn. people online but only 40% of users perform online transactions. Around 54 Mn. users stop online transactions after first trail. In Rural India, around 65% Internet users are non-users of online transactions and majority of non-users are from Rural India. This RailWire Saathi will promote the population to go "Digitally", to perform online transactions and to avail maximum no. of Government services through online mode. They will assist in spreading the Digital Literacy mainly in Rural India. By providing the Digital services to the masses, RailWire Saathi will earn by providing Digital services to the masses. By this RailWire Saathi are becoming self-sustainable and they are becoming "Digital Entrepreneurs".



The kiosks are designed to setup at Railway Stations because Railway stations are ideal because of the availability of power, high speed internet connectivity, central location and covered secure space. The RailWire Saathis are trained to manage the services with remote hand- holding support by RailTel. A RailWire Saathi is expected to earn Rs 5000 to 15000 a month after an initial gestation period of 6-12 months depending on the population served and may increase as more services are enabled.

Indicative List of Services:

1. Citizen services: Scheme Eligibility - Collecting the citizen personal / family profile and identifying all the eligible state and central schemes. This is 100% match - not approximate- against ALL the eligibility criteria mentioned in these schemes using Rail Wire's AI based platform.

- Scheme application - Applying for various schemes: Though the platform is capable of automatic form filling and pushing to the Govt. portals through APIs, most of the Govt. department portals do not support it. Platform assists in filling these fields, attaching the right kind of documents, exceptions in case of missing documents etc.
- Financial Literacy- To create awareness to access and manage online accounts. Hand- holding towards electronic transactions. Support in accessing credits and managing repayments.
- Wallet management - Private wallet for the VLEs which is linked to multiple services like automatic deduction, refilling, revenue splitting etc. and connected with various payment gateways.
- Loan eligibility check - reviewing the citizen profile to match with the loan eligibility criteria of different MFIs. Actual loan disbursement and collection will be handled by the MFIs – this service only provides a screening and passing the eligible profiles to MFIs who will contact the citizen and take it forward.
- Health screening - Screening of the citizens for specific health conditions based on any given protocols.
- RailWire Wi-Fi services.
- Assisted e-Commerce: There is an aspiration to avail the supply chain efficiencies in e-commerce, but online payments are a hurdle. RailWire Saathi can be the nodal point for ordering as well as delivery through the RailWire wallet arrangement with the app automating and tracking last mile transactions. Conversely rural producers can be assisted with market information and potential buyers.
- Ticketing services: Rail and bus ticketing. All RailWire Saathi's can be made Rail Ticketing agents including UTS ticketing and reduce pressure on counters
- Utility bill payments.
- Mobile ,DTH recharge, cable and MFI payments
- Financial Inclusion (banking correspondent)
- Insurance
- RailWire Kiosks can also become the extension counters for NIOS (National Institute of Open Schooling) and virtual skill development programs where a tablet café can be created especially power and shelter are available by GP.

Special Focus on Digital Payments can be achieved:

- RailWire Saathi's can be trained to evangelize digital payments and services of SBI and other PSU banks.
- M-POS facility available on the
- Railwire Saathi platform can facilitate the utility of Rupay card in remote locations.

Matrix Society is implementing Railwire Saathi program in Six States:

1. Haryana (12 Stations)
2. Madhya Pradesh (11 Stations)
3. Bihar (11 Stations)
4. Assam (11 Stations)
5. Uttar Pradesh (6 Stations)
6. Arunachal Pradesh (1 Station)

Sustainable Agriculture Through Farmers Capacity Building & Exposure Visit:

Technological up-gradation and innovation have been the hall mark of Indian agriculture. NABARD has been in the forefront in facilitating and adoption of new technology by farmers/ entrepreneurs through various institutions/ agencies like banks, corporate, NGOs, SHG and Farmers' Clubs. With a view to widen the horizon of new agro-technology, it was felt that traditional farmers may be motivated to adopt new technology by exposing them to innovative projects being implemented by various agencies in different parts of the country. Accordingly, it has been decided that NABARD would extend 100% support towards the cost of such exposure visit of the farmers to enable them to adopt new technology.



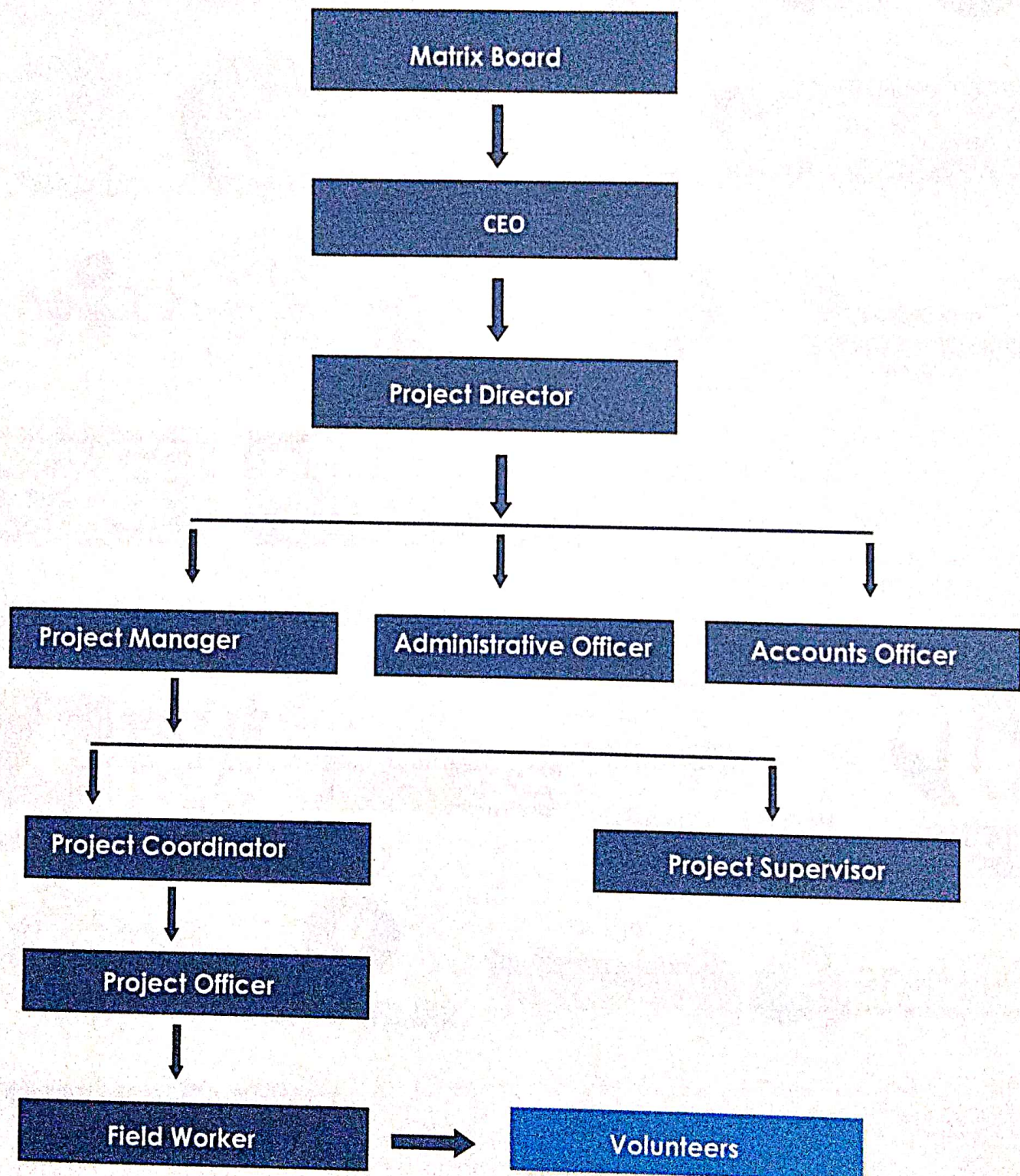
Exposure visit enabled farmers from Guru gram and Nuh district of Mewat regions to interact with and learn from each other, allowing them to view practical examples of successful integration of sustainable practices in farming communities like their own. They are integral to sensitizing the farmer to Matrix Society's message of sustainable agriculture



Farmers Producer Organization: Matrix Society is implementing Sustainable Agriculture project by forming Farmers Producer Organisation for the promotion of FPOs in India. The program is supported by NABARD. Now, the organization is implementing various projects for promotion of FPOs/ FPCs in Nuh and Gurugram Districts. The focus is on bringing the collective strength among the farmers to get the benefits through forward and backward linkages.

Matrix Society is specially working with Meo farmers. We have promoted 10 FPOs till March 2020. Similarly, the organization has promoted few Women FPOs. Till date various Govt. officers, NABARD Officials have visited these FPOs. Many farmers have been received exposure visit with the thought of promoting the same. We facilitate these FPOs to develop linkages and undertake interventions which can provide direct and indirect benefit to the farmers.
